Here is poor Moses out in the desert with the Israelites – who have been rebelling, making golden calf's, and it looks as if Moses is getting to the end of his tether and he wants someone else to help him lead the people of Israel.

And out of shear exhaustion he pleads with God to show him or tell him who he will send to help Moses lead his people.

But God replies – but I know you Moses, I am all you need. But Moses continues the argument and says – "Yeah but these are

your people – this nation is yours, and I need more proof of your glory before I can do the things you're asking."

These frustrations of Moses I feel are how we feel at this time. We wonder who is leading us, we hear grumbling from the crowds and we want to know when everything will be all right again y

everything will be all right again, when things will be back to normal.

Moses was saying well God if you are so great and glorious then show me – how can I look after your people if I don't see your glory." He was pretty cheeky, I thought, talking to God like that.

And God says OK because I know you are a faithful servant.

So God lets Moses experience God's glory. But God says, 'but you're not allowed to look on my face.'

You see Moses was feeling down, as we all are, and wanted to have some physical

proof that God was there and that he would be there for Moses when things got tough. And God was faithful because he loved Moses and so he was given permission to see God in person – but only from the rear view.

But for us too, living in this day and age, we find it hard to see where God is in our lives.

But I believe we are able to see God in creation and in the love and support of the people around us and in the people He calls us to serve.

God has come close to us in a very special way since Moses' time – we are able to see God in the sunrise or sunset. We can see God in the smile of someone who cares, but also in the face of those who struggle and are hurting.



All because God revealed himself in his son Jesus, and then gave us the Holy Spirit, so that we can experience God with us and within us every hour of our lives.

Moses had to plead with God for this experience of God, but we can have it through the gift of the Holy Spirit, which is constantly with us

I like that image of God covering Moses with his hand until he passes and then Moses is able to see the back of God.

In some ways that's the image of God I would like to have because it means if all I can see is the back of God then it means I must be following him and He will lead me to where He wants me to be.

A Journey to the Mountain... Part 1. Exodus 32

When the people saw that Moses had not come down from the mountain but was staying there a long time they gathered round Arron and said to him, "We do not know what happened to this man Moses who led us out of Egypt: so, make us a God to lead us."

I have often wondered why the people didn't go up the mountain to find him. Why didn't Arron or Hur simply follow on later? They must have known where he was going because they helped him and his Bagman Joshua prepare. Faced with the twofold crisis of being in a desert isolated and with their leader gone they made their choice; they made their own God and threw a big party.

"Seek God wherever you are, and wherever you go I will be with you until the end of the ages, come to the mountain and seek my face and on your journey continue to spread the good news among my people."

Projects during COVID-19 restrictions


I have compiled a book about William Walter Tyrrell Stanford. My father is writing his life story and asked me to gather the material we had about William. There were a few holes in the info, so I went looking and found enough material for a book. If you have ever been to the Melbourne General Cemetery and done the 'Notable and Notorious' tour, you may remember that William Stanford was one of the notorious people included.

William is my 2x Great Uncle by marriage. He spent many years in Pentridge prison, wrongly accused, for being a bushranger. While there he carved a beautiful fountain, which was, in 1872, erected in Gordon Reserve, Spring St, Melbourne, between Parliament House and the Old Treasury Building. William was released from prison in 1871, and pardoned, after serving 15 years of his 31-year sentence. A friend, LL Smith, a politician and doctor, who had fought for William's release, set him up as a monumental mason.

William created many gravestones in the Melbourne General and St Kilda Cemeteries. William married twice; both of his wives had the name Mary Ann which made initial research confusing. The gravestone at the Melbourne General Cemetery is what he initially created for my 2x Great Aunt. Within 7 years of her death, William, his second wife and only child had also died. They are all buried in the one grave. He had lived for only 8 years and 8 months after his release from prison.

The fountain is still standing. I am at present trying to find members of the family of William's second wife so we can organise a 150th remembrance celebration at the fountain in April 2022. The book is not yet complete as I am waiting until restrictions ease and I can visit the State Library where some of William's personal items are stored.


