30TH ANNIVERSARY OF RENEWAL OF DIACONATE

As we approach the 45th birthday of the Uniting Church in Australia why are we just celebrating the 30th anniversary of the Diaconate?

All three of our founding churches had various forms of formal Diaconal Ministry usually known as Deaconesses. These were mostly women who felt a strong call to ministry but whose churches would not ordain them simply because they were women. Over time men who felt called to a ministry to 'those on the edges of both the church and society' were commissioned as 'Deaconesses'. Two of these men are now ordained Deacons.

At the time of union, agreement had not been reached on how this ministry would be recognised in the new church. One of the major stalling points was the celebration of the sacraments. It took a number of Assemblies before the proposal as we know it today was accepted. Deaconesses in the Uniting Church gathered together in Melbourne (appropriately, as this was where Roland House the Presbyterian Deaconess training college had been) for a week's intensive in-service training and were ordained together in a great service of celebration.

So it is that the 30th anniversary of the renewal of the Diaconate is 15 years behind the formation of the UCA. Read this extract from the recent Assembly Day two Highlights:

"In the evening session Assembly members acknowledged with joy and expressed deep gratitude for the ministry of the diaconate within the Uniting Church in Australia, noting the 30th anniversary of the renewal of this ministry. The proposal emphasised the need for theological colleges to provide specific courses and training for deacons in the Uniting Church within the varied contexts in which they work. After the decision, the President invited Deacons who were present to stand and the whole Assembly prayed over them. There was an encouragement to take the time to listen to a Deacon and share their good news stories."

PARTNERSHIP SERVICE JUNE 5th




REPORT FROM COCO

(CoCo have not met in May – however here is the report from April (meeting on 2/4/22) that was missing from last PiP)

Planning for the MRP – Rose Broadstock – vision & Mission, Exploring new models of church, strong relationships with community, new models of worship and mission, a range of worship times.

1/ **Enhance links with community.** – Intentional conversations with Neighbourhood Houses – *How can we work more together?*

Special events, creative noticeboards.

2/ **Partnership: Improving partnership sustainability** – Review use of resources, including building, manses and programs. Financials gathered.

Explore sources of funding, including costs of a 2nd minister. What role?

Build relationships, social days together.

3/ **Enhance communications – including IT.** Link churches with technology – online activities (eg book-club) and worship

Upgrade website.

Include online chat and IT use training.

4/ **Worship: expectations and opportunities.** – All congregations agree to meet at the same time for possibility of shared online worship. Could include various alternatives, eg a pre-recorded reflection or conversation, downloadable order of service, experimentation with different worships. Offer different kinds of worship in non-church location eg Tylden, Kyneton.

The possible plan from here:

Ministry team organises a meeting with congregations to discuss the proposals.

Consider one church council rather than lots of meetings (safety, insurance, staffing, Church Council roles). Finance and property stay with congregations.

Review all initiatives in August 2022.

Meg hopefully to be a Minister in Association (MIA)

Remember that the ministry team needs to know Pastoral care needs in congregations.

We need to be conscious of Annette's time – please don't contact Friday unless urgent.

More Sacrededge Highlights

This year was my first experience of the Sacred Edge Festival, and I don't think it will be my last. So many new experiences for me but my top 'take away' moments were:

- After a Climate Panel with two scientists, together with Scott Darlow (First Nations) and a Queenscliff Climate Action group member, the Question that I walked away with was - When every small thing we can change will contribute towards reducing climate change, why are we, in the Macedon Ranges, having worship in eight reasonably big church buildings each Sunday with, on average 12 - 20 people in each building? Food for thought and change!!

- Scott Darlow (First Nations) telling us that that this was our country too. Most of our families came to Australia from other countries many years ago, countries that we possibly do not know, and may never have been to, and that therefore Australia is our home too. It is our Mother Earth, and it is only by knowing that this is our country, that we will look after it as we would look after our own mothers! Permission from a First Nations person for us to live on this land and call it our home was such a powerful statement! But also with that, the obligation to look after our Mother Earth as we would our own mother.

- Worship on Sunday morning brought tears for me, with its combination of music and storytelling in such a beautiful way. And yes, another Question - Why aren't we releasing our Ministry Team from leading regular Sunday worship each week, to give them the space to lead the Partnership in creative worship once a month, with gatherings in each congregation during the week around a meal with a short worship element? More food for thought. An amazing weekend!

The White Goose Needs Some Assistance


The White Goose is running along quite smoothly every Wednesday now that we've sorted out the roster with several members off to warmer climes!



ENCOUNTER WITH THE BEST OF AUSTRALIA

Last week I went to Lancefield to speak at a World Day of Prayer Service at the Anglican Church. There were people there from all the churches in Lancefield and Romsey, a welcoming group of men and women coming together in this service that connects church people in rural areas and cities within Australia, and Christians around the world especially in 2008 with the women of Guyana. I was almost overwhelmed by the warm welcome, the great conversations after the service and the sharing of personal stories - which after the service was accompanied by a good lunch and cup of tea. Not wanting to quickly leave this most hospitable area, I drove around the countryside and eventually stopped in Romsey, wandering into the town pub on this hot day. As a newcomer into the pub, I felt somewhat intimidated by the groups of men standing around, many of them with their Akubras still on. But one group invited me to join them, and after the introductions were over a man suddenly yelled, "Get this bloke a beer - it's my shout". I ordered a snack to go with the drink and sat down to talk.

The chap next to me, asked many questions, so I told him that I come from a country call Nagaland which is at the tri junction of Tibet, Burma and India. His face lit up and he said "I have never been overseas but one place I would really like to go is Tibet". We talked about Buddhism, India, Nepal, Tibet, Himalayas and everyone in the pub joined in the conversation.

I then had a chance to ask about something I noticed on my drive to Lancefield; the road signs advertising "**fresh potatoes for sale**". I had stopped to buy some but there was nobody except some bags of potatoes and another sign saying "**drop money in the box**". To my surprise I found out that the system works well as the chaps in the pub told me that no one has ever walked away with the potatoes without putting the money in the box.



I also saw signs saying "**cow dung \$2**" but when I stopped to buy, it was all gone. So, after my drink I told the guys in the pub that I was looking for some cow dung for my garden. A man in the corner shouted, "So you are looking for bull shit - we got plenty here!" Everyone laughed but one man said 'horse poo is better and there is plenty in the nearby farm'. When I asked how to get to the farm everyone present in the pub joined in to give ideas and help, and it quickly turned into a community project. One offered his trailer which I had to decline as I had to drive about a hundred kilometers to return it, another offered bags and one phoned a nearby farm to enquire. When I asked the direction to the farm, the gentleman next to me quickly said "I'll take you there; it's only a few kilometers from here". So he jumped into my Ford Station wagon and we talked on our way to the farm. By this time we had become good mates.

When we reached the farm there was a woman working in the sun, sweating heavily but she smiled and was not surprised to see us. She showed us where the 'horse poo' was and told us to take as much as we could carry. I tried to pay but she refused to accept money so we put four huge bags of horse poo into my station wagon and drove back to the town. As we were leaving the farm my friend told the woman he was doing this to show that there are still some good people in Australia. When he got out of my car I thanked him for all he had done and said 'God bless you brother - we will meet again.' I was surprised to see tears in his eyes when he said bye.

Something in the spirit of these folks deeply touched me. Throughout the whole day I had met with open, friendly, hospitable people, all welcoming me into their various communities. As an immigrant I have noticed increasing intolerance of foreigners in recent years but this KARMA (as my friend put it) was like a fresh rain on hot summer's day. I shall never forget this encounter with the best of the best of the best of Australia.
