LOVING OUR NEIGHBOUR ON THIS SIDE OF HISTORY

"Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" He said to him,

'"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.'

This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it:

'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' On these two commandments

hang all the law and the prophets." — Mt 22:34-46

This week in Matt 22:34-46, Matthew's Jesus reminds us of one of the simplest yet most confronting versions of the Gospel: 'You shall love the Lord you God with all your heart, and will all your soul, and with all your mind... and You shall love your neighbour as yourself.'

In Matthew 22, group after religious group of experts in law and tradition come before Jesus to try and trick him into making a mistake that they could use against him. They try and trip him up and test his knowledge of the Torah, try and lead him astray. And time and time again, Jesus turns their questions back on them, silences them and challenges them to think, not just of the law but of the spirit of the law — the reason for which the law was created: to lead, to guide, and to liberate.

The last month in our world has been a challenging one, to say the least. As great walls have come down in Israel and Palestine and great casualties have been felt on both sides, here in Australia a great wall has been erected across our land — red dots on a blue page — showing us our division, showing us that we are far from colourblind, with a fallout that will be felt and remembered for generations.

We now are located in a world where Australia has rejected the request of the Statement from the Heart for constitutional recognition and for a First Nations Voice to Parliament to be enshrined in the Australian constitution. As we no longer live in a world unchanged by Covid 19, now too, our future will be viewed through this history: a voiceless people, once again, silenced. The confusion around the true nature of the referendum has been successful in not only ensuring its failure but also, in dividing us. We have missed the spirit of the law and been bound by the fear of its legalities and implications. When Jesus saw this same fear around legalities and implications of the law he answered with a question: 'Was man made for sabbath or was sabbath made for man?'

The war in Palestine has raised a great beast here in Australia with echoes of antisemitism, hatred and abuse being spread in the streets and on social media to the point that voices from Melbourne Jewish communities have feared for their children's safety, some children being sent to school in plain clothes instead of a uniform that might draw unwanted attention. What have we become?

We have been divided. (Continued on Page 3)



Matthew 5:1-12 (NRSV)

- 1 When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain; and after he sat down, his disciples came to him.
 - 2 Then he began to speak, and taught them, saying:
- 3 "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
 - 4 "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.
 - 5 "Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.
 - 6 "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.
 - 7 "Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.
 - 8 "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.
- 9 "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God. 10 "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- 11 "Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account.
- 12 Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

(from page 1) As a world, as nations that have been formed by Abrahamic values, and as a community, we have failed to love our neighbour as ourselves.

Though many who voted against the referendum sought a better outcome for First Nations people, the shame and anger and fear generated by uncertainty have caused a great rift in our country. Despite the violence that sought freedom from the walled in strip of Gaza, only more fear and hatred has been reaped and sown: deepening a bottomless chasm. These characteristics (fear, anger and shame) are not part of the Godly society that Jesus proclaimed. Violence begets violence. Franklin D. Roosevelt's words are all too potent for our time — that we have "Nothing to Fear but Fear Itself."

A recent 'letter to the editor' in the Midland Express railed against the churches of Woodend for openly supporting the Voice to Parliament, insisting that 'Christianity and politics don't mix'. But here we must remember that Jesus wasn't the European Jesus we see in many renaissance portrayals, Jesus was Jewish. I assure you that by being a Jew under a Roman dictatorship, everything was political. To stand up to Jewish leaders misinterpreting the Torah was political. To speak to women, to touch them and to heal them, was political; to associate with those deemed unclean was political; to make a stand for the rejected and oppressed was political; and to proclaim a reign more important than Cesar's, to start a movement for freedom within an Empire, and to claim allegiance to an authority other than Cesar's — this was very political.

To proclaim that 'Jesus is Lord' was to proclaim that Cesar wasn't. It was to defy the governance of the Roman Empire and locate oneself under a Godly reign. To claim allegiance to a grass-roots Jewish liberation and reform movement of non-violence, and claim a peasant to be your king, was to spit in the face of Empire, to spit in the face of Cesar: the self-declared 'son of God' and 'prince of peace.' This was all more radical and political than we could ever understand.

Jesus' whole life and ministry and death, was political. And it was for the threat of his politics that he was murdered by Empire.

So too, is life for First Nations people. Everything is political. Merely existing in a land that was declared *terra nullius*, was political. So I ask you, what does being the church mean today when we are not the minority being repressed: an experience that formed the very shape of Jesus' life and ministry.

Is Christianity still political? Should it be? Who is it 'not' political for — the 'haves' or the 'have-nots'?

And now we are here, on this side of history, where once again we must ask ourselves 'how do we love our neighbour as ourselves?' — not just our First Nations brothers and sisters but the cultural other, the strangers on the street and those in our families and communities that have become foreign to us? We must ask ourselves the question asked at the inception of the Uniting Church in Australia with fresh eyes and ears: 'what does it mean to be the Church in Australia?', a church located on Aboriginal land? And we must ask ourselves what does it mean to be a follower of Christ on this side of history?

Luke says Jesus was sent "to proclaim release to the captives / and recovery of sight to the blind / to let the oppressed go free / to proclaim the year of the Lord s favour" (Luke 4:17-19). Mark says 'repent! — reorient yourself radically, for the society of God is here! And Paul insists that there is no division in Christ, there is no other allegiance but that of our allegiance to Christ: "There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus" (Gal 3:27-28).

Yet we are not one. We have been divided. We must learn to love again.

If this is our Gospel — if this is the image of God that Jesus embodies on earth; a transformed humanity in a society reoriented by justice, mercy and love — then what does it mean to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind" and to 'love your neighbour as yourself on this side of History?

The time for division is over. "for all of you are one in Christ"







'SHARING SILENT PRAYER AND MEDITATION WITH FLOWERS AND CANDLES.'

A recommendation to people of faith in communities across Australia - in the coming days, can we gather together locally in places that we feel are safe, beautiful and inclusive to share our peace prayers and meditations?

Elaboration: People of faith across Australia have friendships of trust and affection. These have evolved from many moments shared. Moments, that is, of sweetness and celebration as well as poignant moments of grief and sorrow. With all that has taken place in recent days, now is a good time to apply these friendships in simple peace-building initiatives.

Hence this idea...

The suggestion is that local faith leaders and groups might ask others they know to join them for a time together of silent Peace Prayers and Meditations, perhaps with a place to light candles and a water bowl for flowers.

It IS a matter of local initiative and leadership.

Locally, folk will know when it is best to meet. There is much common ground we know we share.

We have the same yearnings for the safety and peace of our loved ones. We know what love and grief feel like. At heart, all our faith traditions encourage compassion. We all offer our spiritual practice - our prayers and meditations - in difficult times.

We are all grateful for the quality of multi-faith and multicultural harmony that we share in Australia. This is a precious treasure.

Sharing such a time of prayer and meditation in places of beauty, like gardens, is important. Sharing in silence is important.

Choosing not to make this a time for speeches and statements is important.

Perhaps some local musicians can help people gather with sounds of beauty. Perhaps they can play again when the time for prayer and meditation concludes and as people light candles, place flowers in a water bowl. Perhaps the Universal Prayer for Peace can be shared. Afterwards, there can be whatever conversations flow between old and new friends. Perhaps there will be next ideas for peace-building that leaders can discuss and afterwards share. It's a matter of doing together carefully now what we do not need to do apart.

Equal the Contest - Film Screening:

During the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Based Violence, Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health is proud to partner with Hume City Council and Macedon Ranges Shire, with support from our local Women's Health organisations, Women's Health in the North and Women's Health Loddon Mallee, to bring our communities a FREE film screening of 'Equal the Contest'. The screenings will be followed by facilitated panel discussions which includes Player and Filmmaker Mitch Nivalis.

Despite increasing participation rates over recent years, statistics show that women, girls and gender diverse people remain underrepresented in sport in on and off field positions, including in media coverage and leadership positions. By challenging gender inequality in community sport, we can create inclusive, equitable, healthy and safe environments for women, men, girls, boys and gender diverse people.

About the film

When a filmmaker joins a new local women's footy club in Regional Victoria, the Mt Alexander Falcons, a simple desire to play becomes a complex journey of inclusion and belonging. An unexpected turn means the team has to fight to play. Their campaign challenges age old sporting traditions and joins the wider movement for gender equity.

Equal the Contest follows the Mt Alexander Falcons football club, a new community level club created in 2021 by and for, women and gender diverse people. The story follows non-binary person Mitch, a new recruit and filmmaker, and provides the viewer with an immersive experience of community football, seeing the game as it's never been seen before from the perspective of their body. Despite fulfilling all the requirements of a new club, The Falcons have their application rejected by AFL Central Victoria and they begin a public fight garnering support from all levels of community, local media and AFL HQ itself. The club forges forward despite their exclusion, attracting players from diverse backgrounds and building a club culture of inclusion that challenges the traditions of AFL.

Equal the Contest is a case study for current day gender inequality, highlighting the challenges still faced by women and gender diverse people who simply want to play football
