

TAKE COURAGE

A couple of months ago, a friend gave me a wonderful gift. It was a slim, paperback book called *Daily Prayer with the Corrymeela Community* by Pádraig Ó Tuama. The book "draws on the spiritual practices of Northern Ireland's longest established peace and reconciliation organisation. For over fifty years, it has been bringing fractured communities

together and resourcing others in the work of healing conflict...Pádraig Ó Tuama is a poet and the leader of the Corrymeela Community" It contains 31 brief gospel texts "weaving in and out of the injunction to not fear." Each of the gospel texts is accompanied by a collect, a particular form of prayer that is quite short and direct. It also has a morning, midday and evening prayer, along with the suggestion that you also pray the included *Prayer for courage* at each of those times during your day.

The *Prayer for courage* begins: "Courage comes from the heart". I came across that idea relatively recently, when it was pointed out to me that the word 'courage' comes to us from the Latin *cor* - perhaps you've come across it in the French *coeur* - heart. Real courage, as distinct from bravado, comes from a place where we are deeply in touch with how we feel. The noted American writer on leadership, Brené Brown, has observed that in all her conversations about courage, whether with high-profile sportspeople, members of the military, corporate high-flyers or leaders in civil society, she is yet to find anyone who can give her an example of someone being courageous without first being vulnerable. She says this applies to moral and emotional courage as much as physical courage. Real courage comes, not from being completely unafraid, but recognising our fears and doing what is right or needed anyway.



As I write this, our Presbytery is preparing to have difficult conversations about our future. By the time you read this, we will have met with others from around our proposed region of the Presbytery. We have tough questions to consider, and a proposed solution to some of the issues that we are facing as a denomination now and into the near future. I hope you have had members of your congregation contributing to this conversation, as I believe that the Macedon Ranges Partnership has some unique experience to share. We came together, recognising there would be difficulties, but with a deep hope in God's ability to bring new life, and a deep commitment to following the call of the Spirit wherever we might be led. (from page 1) The recently released data from the 2021 Census has delivered some sobering news. For the first time since such data has been collected, fewer than half the respondents have identified as Christian. Of course, this presents the Church with opportunities as well as difficulties and concerns, but it ought to make abundantly clear that we can no longer assume that we deserve a privileged position in the community. Our Presbytery conversations need to include the awareness that we are now in the minority.

Perhaps that makes us feel vulnerable. Perhaps that's the very starting point we need to be able to recommit to listening deeply to our heart. Perhaps it's where we need to be to work alongside others who are vulnerable. Perhaps it's where we need to be to follow the Jesus who reached out to the vulnerable people of his time and gave them a new vision of what life in God's kin-dom might look like, here and now; a community of hope based on a different kind of power. The Christ we follow wields the power of sacrifice and slavery rather than domination and might: he "emptied himself, taking the form of a slave...he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross" (from Phil 2:7-8). Can we follow this Jesus, with our whole hearts, and hear the "injunction to not fear"? I hope and pray that the Church, our denomination, our Presbytery, our Partnership, our Congregations, you and I, can dare to find the courage to do just that.

About the book:


You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled underfoot. Matthew 5:13


The Jesus community is called to be the salt of the earth, a metaphor that contains rich and disruptive challenge. Salt is little. We weep salty tears and grow up in dark salty wombs. Salt preserves. Salt draws out taste and too much salt spoils everything. With scholarly insight into the biblical text, early church writers and theology, as well as her pastoral experience in ministry, Sally Douglas invites us to

wrestle afresh with the metaphor of being salt. Here we discover a call into discipleship that is free from the success criteria of consumerist culture and free from nostalgia. The Church as Salt is not a 'how to 'manual. Instead, through stories of ancient and contemporary salty communities, reflection questions and liturgies, the book is a nourishing resource for people and communities seeking faithful ways of being church today.
