ON EAGLE'S WINGS

... Offer to God a sacrifice of thanksgiving, and pay your vows to the Most High. Call on me in the day of trouble; I will deliver you, and you shall glorify me."

Psalm 50:14, 15

In the morning, while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed. And Simon and his companions hunted for him.

Mark 1:35, 36



Jesus often withdrew to a quiet place, a deserted place, sometimes a mountain... I go to the hills... often alone, time in the car to ponder, to listen, to pray.

I have been walking in a new community these past two years – I remain myself but I join in conversations, go to the pub, connect with others that I normally wouldn't associate with (and may well have avoided most of my self-sheltered life). I have put myself in a new place to share the gospel or to share love, kindness and compassion where or when I am needed, and to share new experiences.

The paragliding community — a community I fly in but connect with on the ground, too — doing this new thing: learning, using my brain, watching others as a child watches, listening and absorbing but with the advantage of mature-life-experience and a background in emergency nursing. There is a generosity of shared experiences and a concern for each other's safety. Often faces are hard to recognize until they are combined with helmets, goggles and gliders. Sometimes it is shared stories on the way up to launch that remind me that I've met this one or that one before on a hill. "See you on the next hill!" always follows at the end of the day, even though it might be 12 months before I see that one again.

As an emergency nurse, I am constantly considering the mechanics of trauma and the potential for injury and harm. These thoughts flow into my paragliding. From early in our learning, we are taught to constantly evaluate the situation and conditions. Even before arriving on the hill, questions begin to fill my mind: "How's the wind here? How it is out there? Or up there? Or down in the landing zone (LZ)? What is the skill level of others flying? Can I cope in these conditions? Am I fit to fly? Do I have everything?"

I go with great care into what I do, risk management all the way. It starts with my drive to the hills, paying attention to the road and other road users. Often, this is the most dangerous part of my day away flying. Once on the hill, particularly if I'm

walking up by myself, there is time to look around at the sky, the clouds, the birds and the sheep. I have reflected on the Shepherd who knows each sheep by name and who knows me deeply. In these moments prayer comes easily – often listening, not always talking. (Continued on page 3)

LENT

(from page 1) I'm not praying "God keep me safe!" Instead, I'm giving thanks for the great outdoors, for the scenery, the wind on my face, the joy to be on the hill again – to see the eagles soaring and know the thermals are working: thanksgiving for the wonder of nature!

Often, I've seen eagles on flying days — a good sign for paragliders. I need to remind myself they are not "a sign" from God that I'll be safe, or have a good flying day. My safety comes in assessing and managing my risk, ensuring it all comes together for a safe flight. The eagles mark the thermals... a real sign of rising air, a chance to stay up a little longer.

Last weekend was no different. I've learned to assess when the weather is appropriate for flying, to be on the hill and assess, to not just fly because others are... so I was on the hill – two eagles and a hawk soaring... yes, all was good for me to attempt to take off. I was prepared, my wing was checked and ready: I inflate my wing, the paraglider rises above me in a puff of air; I correct its heading and run a few steps, being lifted into the air as I do so.

"That's how you do it!" I thought to myself, a bit cocky perhaps?? But immediately I sensed something was different this time... something was wrong! My wing, normally easily controlled with a little lean in the direction I want to go – didn't want to turn left! I was sinking faster than normal... heading closer to the hill rather than away from it... I was heading for a steep slope landing and I didn't know how to slope land!!

What goes through peoples' heads in these moments — these moments of danger or life-threatening moments all around the world? Do people pray? Do people cry out to God or to someone else? In the movies people see their life flash before their eyes... How many people even get a chance for a thought other than the very next thing they need to do to survive? Does time slow down? It didn't for me.

How does God work in these moments? Have you ever faced a moment like this? Does God act around us or within us? Does God save us from peril or help us negotiate it? What about those who die doing this same thing? Or the hundreds who die every day in wars or plane crashes or 'on our roads'?

I didn't think about any of this. It didn't even enter my head that this might have been a 'sticky' moment— the hill on my right was rushing towards me! And suddenly...

"Fly the plane! Avoid terrain!" Came the voice from training in my head, and leaning hard away from the hill, yanking around to the left — eventually! — I cleared the immediate terrain, and somehow managed to turn, still flying, towards the landing zone. Having established a safe margin from the ground I checked the glider to try to figure it out – something wasn't right!

Still sinking rapidly, I watched the power-line slide closer beneath me whilst looking for alternative landing spots. I had enough height to look at the glider over my head again. Then I discovered it! A tiny knot in my lines close to the glider – an "aha" moment "—that's what's wrong!" With good clearance from the ground, I had time to reach up to yank on the string with the knot ...but with no effect.

"All good, fly the plane! I <u>can</u> land it like this!" I realised, heading toward a space to land; over the trees; closer to the ground now...

Suddenly, the glider felt normal – blessed relief surged through me – the knot had cleared! For the last few seconds before landing, I knew I could land as I normally would!

I landed, lifting my feet at the last second, wondering if my legs would hold me after such an adrenaline-fueled flight: normally, I aim to step out of the air "like a princess".

I dropped gently onto my foam harness seat and stood up immediately. A burst of emotion overtook me (as it does whenever I manage a 'personal best' – usually pretty glad no one can hear me sobbing!) – great joy, exhilaration, praise for God who has created me and my brain to make it work to follow my learning, to keep me safe, doing all the "right" things in crisis just as I'd been taught. Acknowledgement of this amazing body and brain I've been given – glory to God! Not thanks for keeping me safe, though that was perhaps a part, but awe and amazement and gratitude to One who has made me so complicated to manage this new skill and to bring me and my glider down safely.

Don't get me wrong. I'm no saint, no perfect Christian. I'm just a woman trying to live out God's love in God's creation, still trying to work out how to be a disciple of Jesus in my everyday life. But flying, being up there in the air, being immersed in creation: it blows me away. I find joy in so much of it and always end up giving my thanks to God for the love and the gifts I've been given.

Yes, we are saved by Jesus but how do we choose to live our lives knowing this? I have been given a great gift from God in seeing the beauty and the complexity of life and for this I am grateful: How do you choose to live your life and how do you see God working in it?

The LORD is the everlasting God,

Isaiah 40:28-31 (NRSVue)










40TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION MOUNT MACEDON UNITING CHURCH

COCO REPORT

CoCo met at Tylden on 3rd Feb with a full attendance from all CoCo reps.

The first item to be discussed was the issue as to whether the 5th Sunday in March should be a Partnership service as usual, given that it is also Easter Sunday. One of the church councils had yet to meet to discuss this, so a decision will be made after that.

The attendance at Christmas services around the Partnership was shared, with the view that the community led services had a lower attendance than usual - is this a sign of the times? On the other hand Tylden had about 50 people at their Christmas Eve service, and the joint carol service with the Baptist Church in Kyneton was enjoyed by about 120 people.

The potential lease of the Woodend Manse was approved with a Form to be submitted to Presbytery / Synod. Our liability for Land Tax at Woodend is still unclear, and a follow-up with Synod will be made.

The upgrade of the Partnership web page is underway, and our Facebook page is in need of photos of activities around the Partnership. Please make sure if any people are included in the photos that you have their permission to display these on Facebook.

The Ministry team reported that a new Worship Plan for the first quarter has been sent to Church Councils. This should free Annette to explore some community connections around the Partnership and also to develop connections on social media. When she is not leading worship she will still be in attendance at one of the Partnership churches on most Sundays.

Paul Banks will conclude his time with the whole Partnership on 8th March, but hopes to be able to provide Short Term Supply in a missional role for Kyneton for the rest of March and most of April.

The Kyneton Op Shop has moved to the Kyneton Church Hall, and will have a grand opening on 13th Feb at 4.30 - all welcome. Other activities around the Partnership were also noted - details will be elsewhere in PIP.

It was suggested that churches could be opened up in times of crisis - e.g. Prayers for Peace seems to connect with the community.

Annette will be taking Leave for April, then 1 weeks Study Leave for the first week of May - this includes attendance at Sacred Edge in Queenscliff.

Everyone enjoyed the sumptuous morning tea provided by Tylden.

Our next meeting will be the AGM at Romsey on 6th April.

Palm Sunday – Walk for Refugees and Peace – 24th March

Parliament Gardens (Spring St/Albert St) gathering from 10am. The program will commence at 10.30am with an interfaith segment and prayers for peace, followed by speeches/presentations and the Palm Sunday 'Walk for Refugees' concluding by 12 noon.
