TIME WILL TELL.

"Does God change?" Standing on the footpath outside Whitley Theological College, a fellow student was telling us about a conversation with her son the night before. She is a formidable woman, about my age, but wise beyond my years; a theologian, poet, teacher, prophet, and much more. She had been a primary school teacher, and she has a deep intellect and a passion for theology with children that has led her to further study, lecturing and writing on the subject. I imagined that conversations like this happened in her household all the time.

"Does God change?" her son had asked her. She did what the best teachers do, and invited him to explore his question with her, helping him by asking the kind of questions that might help him to begin to formulate his own answer: "Well, let's see. Do you think God *likes* change?" They then, apparently, had discussed Creation, and the way a tiny seed grows into a plant, and produces leaves, and blossom and perhaps fruit. They might have talked about the mighty geological forces that have shaped our planet, giving us the breathtaking beauty of mountains or the long, slow, work of water on stone that creates river gorges. They might have talked about the evolution of species, or the growth of a

wobbly, leggy foal into a beautiful steed. "Wow!" her son apparently said at the end of their conversation "God must *really* like change!"

This woman has also written about what it is to be a prophet, although I'm sad to say I can't find the piece to quote it. She wrote about the call of the prophet coming to the marginalised, the unexpected ones, the formerly voiceless ones, out of necessity. She wrote of the call of the prophet being for those who cannot ignore the call to speak out, no matter the personal cost, because they know only too well the deeper cost of allowing the forces of violence, prejudice and marginalisation to prevail. They know this because they bear the cost of that most deeply.

It had to be pointed out to me once that prophets are not recognised until beyond the time when their prophesies have proven to be true. In the recent days, there have been many people offering their take on what will happen in Ukraine, whether Russia will invade or not, all with very well-argued reasons for their point of view. Only time will tell us which of these people have read the signs well. The others might be regarded as 'false prophets', but in the moments before the Russian troops either invade or withdraw, no-one really knows. Those who prove to have been able to forecast accurately will be deemed to be the more astute 'prophets' of this particular moment. It would likely have been the same in biblical times. In the meantime, the prophets withstood the derision of those around them. and kept going.

Lent

A season of preparation and discipline that begins on Ash Wednesday and concludes at sundown on Holy Saturday. During the forty weekdays and six Sundays in Lent, the church remembers the life and ministry of Jesus and renews its commitment to him in Christian discipleship. This season is the traditional time to prepare for baptisms and confirmations to be celebrated at the Easter Vigil or on Easter Sunday, or during the season of Easter.

I think I'm only just realising how much has changed and will change in my work with the Partnership as I've moved from having 2 full-time colleagues to having one half-time. The effects of that were a bit disguised by lockdowns and restrictions, but now we are emerging back to full life, it's going to be difficult to juggle the competing demands. You might think this change, the change to a much smaller amount of ministry time, is a 'bad' one. I'm hoping and praying that we will find, within this change, a call to deeper and richer life together, and the leading of the Spirit into new ways of being Church that were previously beyond anything we'd dared imagine.

From the Kyneton Catholic Church:


This year we again join with our Christian Community in sharing the Word of God.

From Wendy Hebbard after reading some reviews about the book **Damascus** by **Christos Tsiolakis**

Melbourne writer, Christos Tsiolakis was brought up with knowledge of the Greek Orthodox Church. This did not result in him having a faith. Nevertheless, Christos has always been very interested in Christianity. His recent book "Damascus" was reviewed by Bri Lee, who said, "I learned more about Christianity in "Damascus" than I did in five years at a Catholic High School". Our main man was Saul. Known now as St Paul, he travelled the world in the years after Jesus in the story of the resurrection. Paul is a figure of extraordinary drama and eloquence. He was a Pharisee and a Roman citizen. He initially persecuted Christians until that dark night on the road to Damascus when he heard a voice thundering, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" He was cast down. He found himself blind until he came to see, and became the supreme exponent and populariser of Christianity (from Peter Craven's review in The Age). This was a stage in history of cruelty and sadism. When one exiled woman feared that her child had died or when a young girl was being stoned to death for adultery. Jesus asked, "Who is without sin? Can I dare cast the first stone?" Unspeakable cruelty and torture at those times, just reveals how barbaric they were. There is a Greek woman of Ephesus who suffers the terrible grief of having a daughter born without an arm. She was left out on the hillside to die. Eventually she found her way to Paul and the comfort of Christ. This landscape at the time was indeed appalling. Full of accumulated atrocity and abomination, the atmosphere of this book is compelling and deeply serious. "Damascus" exhibits the absolute cruelty of paganism and Christianity comes like a messenger to mitigate this.
