## CRACKED POTS AND CRACKPOTS

Let's be very clear: I have never, ever been a gardener.

Everything I touch turns to black. I have been guilty of killing mint and even a small cactus. The mysteries of pruning elude me. The details of fertilisation, how much water is enough or too much, whether a plant needs full sun or partial shade are all mystic arts whose secrets I believe I will never unlock. Other people seem to manage to just stick things in the ground and, "Lo!" a big green leafy thing, likely with flowers and/or fruit, emerges for them. Not for me

At my mother-in-law's funeral, I said it was a testament to her optimism and blind faith that she continued to give me a plant as a gift every Mothers' Day. (Why my mother-in-law gave *me* a gift on Mothers' Day is a curiosity I never unravelled). In later years, the plant's description on the label invariably began with 'Hardy...'. I think perhaps I subconsciously saw that as a challenge. Other well-meaning friends have proffered cuttings from their own gardens, assuring me that this plant was "easy to grow...it just self-seeds and off it goes."

My response to these generous gifts has been to be so terrified that I would do something wrong with them, that I've kept them in their original containers and kept them on the manse porch where I might at least notice they were looking droopy



and sprinkle some water in their direction. This also has the benefit of keeping them safe from my slightly maniacal lawnmowing man who doesn't pause long enough in his labours to notice the aquilegia I've recently planted, which is going quite nicely, thank you very much, until it succumbs to his inattention.

In a conversation with Paul the other week, I was telling him that I've recently decided that I'm going to stop using the term 'sustainable' when it comes to talking about our life together as a Partnership, and my ministry in it. As long as things are 'sustainable' they are travelling along as well as they can...until a wheel falls off. Sustainable is just enough. I'm going to stop using the word 'sustainable' in the same way we were all encouraged to stop using the word 'tolerant' when we talk about the community. 'Tolerance' is the minimal we can do: for our communities to provide equal places for all: we need to talk instead about being inclusive. It's a welcome improvement: inclusive communities instead of tolerant communities.

# The 'Greening of the Cross' on Easter Day in Gisborne

There is a centuries' old tradition in the Western church of 'hanging the greens'. The draping of the interior and exterior of a church could be done at Advent - hence the Christmas wreath with its circular shape representing eternal life - and at Easter. The Gisborne Uniting Church has greened its cross on Easter Day as a sign that 'what was dead is now alive'. This continues the Christian motif of the tree which becomes the instrument of death - as in the cross - but is 'raised' to life by a glorious display of greenery and flowers.

In recent years it also has become a symbol of the commitment of Christians to cherish the environment.





(from page 1) I was saying this in the conversation with Paul, along with saying that I'm going to start thinking and talking about what is 'fruitful' or 'flourishing' instead of 'sustainable'. These words help us to consider going beyond the status quo, beyond maintaining what already is, and out into the possibility of what growth might look like. In our life of faith, 'growth' might be more people and bigger congregations, but it also might look like a deeper connection to God, a richer life of faith among the gathered community, more intentional mission to the communities in which we live. It might work from the permaculture-type principals we talked about last year: looking at what our resources are, asking what is needed, wondering what might best grow here, asking what needs to be changed to allow for flourishing

Paul's response, without knowing anything about my front porch, was to suggest that we might need to crack a few pots open. That allowing things to become pot-bound was never going to lead to flourishing. It might be sustainable, but never fruitful.

I realised, with horror, that that is literally how I had been living. Curating a collection of pot-bound plants, relatively safe, but not with any prospect of any kind of flourishing. In fact, probably looking reasonably ok, but on their way to a slow, sad death. I was mortified. I needed to do something.

So the next afternoon, with the help of a good friend, I cracked some pots. Some seaside daisies, some aquilegias, some sedum and some harlequin flowers (all probably able to be described as 'Hardy...') have been planted in the actual

ground, giving them space to grow. They've been watered and nourished. One of the aquilegias is looking decidedly iffy, but that's ok. There will be 'failures', or rather learning opportunities, but hopefully much flourishing. And I don't just mean the plants.

I felt like a crackpot. It felt like a prophetic action. It felt like a call to breaking some more pots where things are sustainable...but not providing opportunity for flourishing. It felt like a challenge to break new ground and get hands dirty, to learn about pruning for growth, to water and nourish and nurture tiny shoots of new life. It felt like an invitation to be fruitful and flourish.

Where might that happen for you, for your congregation, for the Partnership, for the community around you? How are we bound by the safety of our current structures that might constrict our growth? What needs to be cracked open to enable new life to emerge and grow? Will you come and be a crackpot too?

# **Mozart's Requiem**

The Gisborne Singers are presenting Mozart's Requiem for their first concerts of the year in collaboration with the Macedon Ranges
Chamber Orchestra. Guest artists, soprano Merlyn Quaife (also the choir's Patron), mezzo soprano Kristen Leich (a resident of the Macedon Ranges), tenor Michael Petruccelli and baritone Teddy Tahu Rhodes will be performing as soloists. Luke Severn, Gisborne Singers'
Artistic Director will be conducting.

Commissioned to write the Requiem for a Viennese Count Franz von Walsegg in late 1791 to commemorate the first anniversary of the death of his young wife Anna, it remained unfinished at the time of Mozart's death on 5 December that year. A student of Mozart's, Franz Xaver Süssmayr, presented the finished work to the Count, but others may have contributed.

Mozart's widow Constanze was responsible for a number of stories surrounding the composition of the work, including that Mozart came to believe that he was writing the requiem for his own funeral.

St Mary's Anglican Church in Sunbury at 2pm on Sunday 30 April.

The second performance will be held at

Our Lady of the Rosary Catholic Church in Kyneton at 2pm on Sunday 7 May.

The choir's famous afternoon tea will be available at the Kyneton performance.


