STRUGGLES AND JOY

In the last few weeks, we have been following the family line of Abraham; the division between the offspring of Hagar and Sarah, that is Ismael and Isaac, Isaac's marriage to Rebekah, them having twin boys, Esau and Jacob and the rivalry between the two. Birthrights and priorities, favour and abandonment.

Throughout the unfolding of Abraham's lineage, we see and are told of God's journeying with, God hearing the cries of those in anguish and God's presence and attentiveness, even with those who have been deceitful and treacherous.

It seems to me that, particularly in our Western way of thinking, that many of us have a perception of God as only being with the good and the righteous. Perhaps it has come about because we attribute blessings from God on the Chosen and therefore God is not present with the perpetrators of evil. It can be perceived as very black and white, good versus evil type understanding of God.

What if we can consider that we all have the potential for good and evil, kindness and selfishness, altruism or egoism? That we all have the potential to push along what we think is for the best, despite God's assurances. We all have the capacity within us to give love or give hate.



In Genesis 29 this week the story continues with more deception. Jacob loves Rachel, Jacob and Laban, Rachel's father and kinfolk of Jacob, swear an oath, make a covenant that if he serves Laban for seven years then he can have Rachel's hand in marriage. After seven years of work by Jacob, fulfilling his side of the agreement, Laban slips his elder daughter into the tent and by morning light it is event that Jacob has laid with Leah, not Rachel and she is now his wife. As Jacob had deceived his brother in the past, now deception was played out on him.

The Scriptures show us stories of real people, not Hollywood picture-perfect heroes and heroines, but people with real fears and faults. We read of their struggles as well as their joys and their hopes. In each story we are reminded over and over again that God is in the midst of their lives, hearing their cries, seeing their suffering, and feeling their emotions with them.

As we continue in this COVID-19 period of uncertainty where many are suffering and feeling anxious about this new experience of life be assured that God is with us. God who is not only present in the joys and blessings of life but also in the messy, unpredictable times of life. Just as he was with those in ancient times, God is still with us today. God bless you.

PARENTING EXPERT

A recent review (July 18th “AGE”) of the contribution of psychologist Steve Biddulph to advice for parents (and grandparents?) revealed some interesting insights: (*Summarised*)

To quote – “he thinks that rich children are often emotionally deprived. —Some parents don't really raise their children they just manage them. This is particularly a feature of affluent parents. If I was a child in Australia now, I would want to be born in the middle.’

---If you're born into a poor family, the stress on parents makes life very difficult, but the children of the wealthy face a different kind of stress. There's an odd combination of high expectation but low emotional connection. Parenting has been handed over to others. Some children are in after-school care till 9pm and others are sent to boarding schools even when their homes are nearby.

Steve has sold millions of books. If you're born in the middle, income wise, life tends to be more nurturing and normal. Parents are much more likely to come home in time to kick a ball and they really want to be with their children. But financial pressure on the middle tier is changing. It is very difficult to live on one wage. In a world that's vastly more prosperous than the 1950s, there are very strong headwinds.

We are still thawing out from a culture which frowned upon shows of affection.

It's important to tell your children that you love them.

One of his first books, “Raising boys” stated that in 1994 fathers spent an average of eight minutes a day with their kids. By 2010 that figure had doubled. The whole profile of fatherhood has shifted.

One of the concluding remarks in this particular article, mentioned that children used to be part of the team, of the family. Now they are at the center (not necessarily a good thing!)

Biddulph has in recent times been working to support refugees and to fight climate change.

Like thousands of other adults, he marched in support of the student rally- Strike Against Climate Change. The kids are justifiably scared. They study science and they know all about climate change. We adults can't abandon them. He continued – “the kids were doing exactly what you would hope young people would do - getting involved in democracy, instead of being disenfranchised and alienated. “

in gratitude?

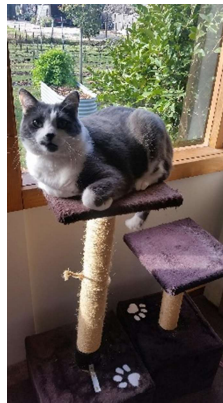
The answer comes

leaves, revitalising people and churches by regenerating the Holy Spirit that continues to regenerate the Church.

So have any churches started sprouting green leaves? "Absolutely," Rev Rose Broadstock, Mission Development Strategist for the presbytery, enthuses. "Part of our strategy is to develop 'Regeneration' ministers who support congregations developing fresh expressions of church.

"A great example is the work done by our 12 churches in the Macedon Ranges. Representatives from all congregations came together regularly over the course of a year to workshop, talk, imagine, argue and laugh over coffee and food to create a shared vision and shared values. They were then able to envisage how to share three 'Regeneration' ministers who will help them imagine ways of being Church that respond to the culture and needs of their local communities. On Sunday 1 March at Kyneton Uniting Church, 155 people of all ages representing the 12 congregations gathered for joyful worship to celebrate all they had accomplished."

The Macedon model continues to flourish. Ideas for new models of mission include a spirituality centre, a community garden shared with asylum seekers, worship in cafes and community meals in op shops. The ministers and the presbytery will support the development of these ideas through training, coaching, the opportunity to belong to a Pioneering Learning Community, and some small seeding grants for the chosen new initiatives.

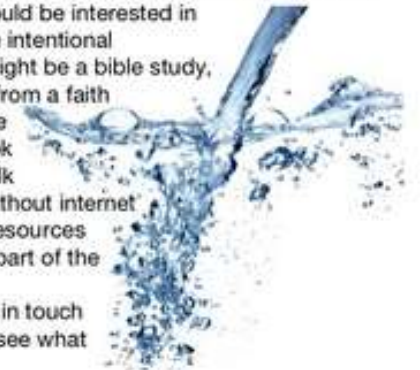

Did you know?

Did you know you can easily download and watch our Partnership worship videos? You can then watch a segment or even the whole video any time that suits. All you need to do is:

1. Download a YouTube downloader from your computer's "play store" or "app store". There are many free ones available. I use a program called "Any Video Converter". It has no ads or other "bloatware" that many free software has. Just go to https://www.any-video-converter.com/products/for_video_free/ and click on the "Free Download" button. Follow the installation instructions.
2. Open your YouTube downloader. Copy the video link that I sent you for the video you want to download.
3. Click on the "Add URL(s)" tab.
4. Click the + button on the URLs bar.
5. Paste the link of the video you copied into the space provided.
6. Select "Start Download".
7. Once downloaded, go to the folder your video has been put into. For me, it is the Videos folder in a folder called "Any Video Converter".

You can now watch the video at your leisure!

If you want to go back and watch a previous video, select this link

Select the video you want to watch. When the video page opens pause the video so you can focus on the next step. Right click on the video you are watching and select from the menu, "copy video URL". Then do steps #2 – 7 above.

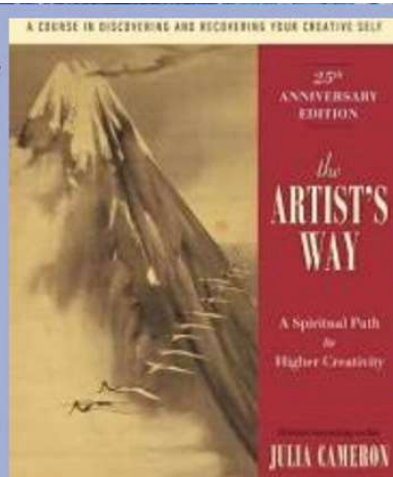
