

WHAT SHALL WE RENDER ...?

This morning, the radio station I listen to as I wake up had a question for listeners to respond to: "Where have you taken your pillow?" It's a bit of fluff, the kind of thing they do each morning, asking questions that sometimes lead to answers that shed fascinating light on the wide variety of ways that we humans think and behave, and on people's life experiences. The show has a main presenter, a sidekick and a newsreader. The newsreader said that she takes her pillow when she travels, but never interstate. She just won't take it over the border, for reasons she couldn't fully explain! It was interesting to hear how attached to

their pillows some people are...carting them on international flights, giving up precious space for clothes or other things in their suitcases, or risking relationships with people who didn't 'get it'.

Later this morning, my daily email from the ABC arrived with a link to the story of a day in the life of a twelve year-old Gazan girl, which had been shown last night. In it, Hiba Abu Sadeq's poignant face stared out, eyes far, far



everything now. Water, falafel, even for death, you wait in line."



During Sunday worship, we watched a video that allowed us to eavesdrop on a conversation between Common Grace Director Gershon Nimbalker and their First Nations leaders Bianca Manning and Safina Stewart, along with Uncle Dr Pastor Ray Minniecon. As a gift for churches for the

Sunday before the 26th January, they were reflecting on the monument in Sydney to the first Christian service of worship conducted on this land, and the text from Psalm 116:12 inscribed on it - What shall I render unto the Lord for all his benefits towards me?

They wondered together how that question might continue to offer insights to Australian Christians, how it might challenge us to consider our response to God's goodness and generosity. Of course, the people originally

Lent

A season of preparation and discipline that begins on Ash Wednesday and concludes at sundown on Holy Saturday. During the forty weekdays and six Sundays in Lent, the church remembers the life and ministry of Jesus and renews its commitment to him in Christian discipleship. The season is the traditional time to prepare for baptisms and confirmations to be celebrated at the Easter Vigil or on Easter Sunday, or during the season of Easter.

On January 26 1938, Aboriginal leaders including <u>William Cooper</u>, met for a Day of Mourning, seeking equality and full citizenship (though it would take another 30 years). The Australian Churches were then asked to set aside the Sunday before January 26 as Aboriginal Sunday (previously called Aborigines' Day), a day for Christians to act in solidarity with Aboriginal peoples and the injustices being experienced. The first Aboriginal Sunday is suggested as occurring in 1941, although was referenced in a letter from William Cooper to the John McEwen, Minister for the Interior written on 19 January 1938 and also referenced in the Herald (Melbourne) newspaper on 18 January 1939.

(from page 1) originally addressed by the sermon on this text might have found deep irony in the idea that God had rendered them any benefits. Many convicts were more the victims of crippling poverty rather than hardened criminals, sentenced for thefts of tea, handkerchiefs, clothing and bedding. Together with their jailers, they were transported to the other side of the world, to a land vastly different from the one they'd left behind, likely never to see loved ones again. It would have been an extremely optimistic person who could see the benefits they'd received on that hot February morning on Gadigal country impaled by a British flag.

Things are different now, though. Here we are, most of us able to have comical conversations about our preferences for the things that bring us comfort. Almost none of us have ever needed to send our twelve year-old daughters out each day in search of water. We might be able to believe that God has blessed us by not placing us in Gaza, and give thanks that we live in such a peaceful country. It's not the whole story of course: light and dark exist in every life, and external appearances can be deceiving. Despite the grinding poverty and hardships of her life, Hiba finds space and time (and somehow the energy) to play. And we, in the midst of our generally materially comfortable lives can still face tragedy and despair.

It was a remarkable conversation, and an inspired idea, I thought, for a reflection for the first Australia Day after the referendum on the First Nations Voice to Parliament. I had no idea that this monument existed, but there it sits, on the corner of Bligh and Hunter Streets in Sydney. It's interesting to see what the Psalmist has laid out as the Lord's benefits in the prior verses to the one quoted: God hears, God protects and saves, God vindicates, God delivers souls from death, eyes from tears, feet from stumbling. In response to their own question, the Psalmist says they will celebrate deliverance, call on God, fulfil their vows to God before all people (twice!), declare themself God's servant and make an offering of thanks. What might that look like in our world? It made me wonder how we, as followers of the One who "has nowhere to rest his head" live faithfully in these days. How might we declare ourselves God's servants and join with God in the work of deliverance, protection and vindication? How might we make meaningful celebration and fulfil our vows to God with thankfulness?

I wonder if these words can continue to challenge and inspire us in the Partnership throughout this year and beyond, as Uncle Ray, Safina, Bianca and Gershon hope, if they can form a question that inspires us to action as Australian Christians: What shall we render unto the Lord for all his benefits towards us? I'd love to hear your responses!

The Sunday before 26th Jan is Aboriginal Sunday. In Kyneton, Pip led the service using resources provided by Assembly and Common Grace.

The artefacts pictured (here and on page 6) were given to John Barry Thomson, the great, great grandfather of Jenny Elston and the son of James Thomson, the stonemason who designed the Kyneton Uniting Church building. The paragraph below is copied from the family history book Jan Telford compiled in about 2005 "From Aberdeenshire to Balkebah"

John Barry Thomson spent his early years at Avoca with his family. They had trekked from Sydney to Queanbeyan before coming overland to Avoca Station on the Avoca River. On the way they passed through Kyneton and camped one night in a hut on "Darlington".

One old resident of Kyneton was H Smith of Chalk Farm near Boggy Creek; he saw the 'John Barry' sailing ship leaving Dundee with a load of tradesmen. H Smith lived to see the infant J.B Thomson (who was born

on board the ship while it was waiting for favourable weather to set sail from Dundee) years afterwards in Kyneton, and knew his father, James (a stonemason).

John Barry did not like the building profession, so opened a butcher's shop in 1856, in Epping Street, Kyneton next to their family home. He also dealt extensively in stock.

John Barry had made friends with the Avoca tribe of aboriginals who taught him bushcraft and to swim. They carried him out on their backs into the river. They loved him so much that in the early 1860's they visited him in Kyneton. When they arrived it alarmed the residents, but when they found that the aboriginals had only come to visit their friend John Barry Thomson, the residents relaxed and enjoyed spear and boomerang throwing by day and corroborees by night. The tribe camped in Market Street and during the corroborees the males danced furiously and excitedly round the





great fire and the lubras beat time. In all five corroborees were performed in honour of John Barry. It was an exciting time for everyone concerned and probably the only time on record that blacks travelled in a tribe to see a white man and the last time that the tribe came south of the Murray. Another coincidence was that one of Mr. Thomson's daughters, Mrs. Jas. Anderson, afterwards lived on the spot where the natives so honoured her father.
