WHY ME?

The attendant at the Institute for the Blind has informed me that ninety percent of those who attend there suffer the same condition.

I don't know whether or not I should apologise, because, as the title will indicate, this item is about me. Let me say at the outset that its purpose is not to evoke or elicit sympathy.

A condition has developed in my eyes technically known as Macular Degeneration; in other words, it is age related deterioration of the surface of the retina and is incurable, irreversible and progressive. The effect of the condition is quite frustrating to say the least. I find it difficult to read, even with special aids. I have to sit within a foot or two of the television screen to see any detail. I am unable to buy anything in shops which means that I cannot, without assistance, buy gifts or greeting cards for those near and dear to me. I have had to stop driving the car which means loss of independence.

It would be useless for me to attend cinemas or stage presentations. I have had to restrict my bowling activities because of difficulty in seeing the jack and the other bowls. Minor repair jobs become well nigh impossible. There is the embarrassment of not being able to recognise people known to me who I meet in the street. All in all the condition means a severe diminishing of quality of life, although, of course, there are still many things that can be enjoyed.

Despite the knowledge that there are many others worse off, the temptation comes to ask guerously - "Why Me?" What have I done to deserve this? Questions, of course, to which there is no answer.

On the other hand, if by some miraculous intervention I should regain normal vision, I would be compelled to ask again - "Why Me?"! Why should I be singled out for special treatment when so many others continue to suffer? And I am forcibly reminded of the late Fred Hollows who, when someone commiserated with him on his terminal illness, responded with the remark that "the illness attacks others, why should it pass me by?"

No there is no real answer to the problem of suffering. There is no ready explanation why some undergo physical or mental problems and others escape!

MY WEEK OF GUIDED PRAYER

I have just completed my guided prayer week. It was very kind of a team of catholic women to volunteer their time to our Church of Christ. About ten people availed themselves of this experience. There were four nuns and I was allocated to a catholic laywoman, married with four children.

Each morning at 8am, she and I sat in a small prayer room at the church, with two armchairs and a sunny window. We talked mostly and prayed little. She gave me the story of Zacheus to ponder for the whole week. I struggled to find new insights and applications for my life.

She also encouraged me to find 30 minutes to meditate each day. It is impossibly hard for me to silence the chatter in my head and my noisy thoughts.

However, I am still learning.

A few anecdotes since we finished the week -

First, as my car radio is broken, I have been immersed in silence, whilst driving. This has been helpful.


Secondly, I have taken her suggestion of sitting in a special armchair in the lounge, gazing out on our huge gum tree and the wonderful sky. Usually this occurs when I rise. However, the household clatter was an amusing distraction, with Ted banging saucepans, trying to be helpful washing up; and our 23 year old daughter getting ready for work and calling out this and that. I will need to find time when the house is empty.

Another little plan of mine is to arrive at appointments 15 minutes early and meditate in the car or similar.

As yet, God has not spoken to me. I might be terrified out of my wits if He did! Thanks again and God bless you,
