




HAVE YOU HEARD THE STORY OF TATURA UNITING CHURCH?



It faced what many churches face: maintenance problems, roof problems, uncomfortable and cold in winter. It needed significant amounts of money to





What about if we could find a property that suited our purposes better, that gave us ways to really connect with local people? So the congregation started looking around and eventually sold their property in order to buy a café and gallery in the middle of town. It had a great kitchen and a café space. The gallery space (with an open fire) became a perfect space for worship, meetings and spaces to share with the community. Upstairs was a flat that could be rented out.

So now a cold church space with a small congregation and big maintenance problems has become a fit for purpose space, full of life. Look at the three

This story is told not to encourage everyone to go off and buy a café. It's told to emphasis the wonderful benefits to be expected of thinking creatively and courageously.

We don't need to go far from home though to see other great examples.

It's been great to spend time at **Woodend UC**. In case you don't know the story, the congregation decided that Church in its current form had ended. It must have been a sad moment for that little group. Yet how great to look at its growth since then. The development of a Faith Community Monday afternoons with the Minister present most weeks. No more meetings, Church Councils, looking for people to take on roles. Just gathering for worship and community. Building on the fantastic work of the Op Shop, and with wonderful help from a few people from other congregations, a weekly community lunch began, to which people from the community began to attend. Covid put paid to all this for a while, but now all this has recommenced, and it is exciting. Also, community groups like Rural Australians for Refugees have begun to gather there so there's a feeling of the doors open and the community coming through them.

Simple church, being together to eat, pray and talk, and share with the community — a story of moving from dying to thriving. And Riddells Creek UC would be another.

Other examples in the Partnership have inspired me as I've spent these few short months with you. The idea of Fish and Chips night at **Kyneton** alternating with a fortnightly Sunday worship. Less stress for lay worship leaders, a strengthening of the congregation's relationships, sometimes better attendance than Sunday morning, sharing together round tables – relaxing, eating, praying - and seeing the Minister much more. It's an inspiration to see a congregation experiment with alternating Sunday morning worship and other worship, and bravely give it a go.

Further North, how great to see the Redesdale Café gathering! Thank you Brian and the Northerners for your faithful, imaginative mission heart.

(from page 1) It was exciting to hear about the Christian Meditation group meeting at **Romsey**. Could this be an opportunity to consider the Kyneton model of alternating Sundays and other times? It's great to hear the conversation going on here too.

The temperature is warmer, and worshipping together feels warmer at **Tylden** as it meets for church round the table in the kitchen, as Jesus and his disciples always did. Simple but intimate church. A great example of a way of being Church that people not used to traditional Church could feel very comfortable with. Not to mention breakfast worships in the park! Tylden might be small, but its capacity for experimentation is inspirational.

Interestingly, **Gisborne** maintain a traditional Sunday morning approach and regularly welcome new people, so that approach is working where they are. So then the question isn't really about Sunday worship, but what way of being church will help us thrive here in this particular place, with less work for our leaders yet has potential to create more ways for local non-Church people to find a way in.

The need to think about new ways of being Church has become sharper than ever, as the Ministry team changes. Once there is only one Minister (Nov 2022) the preaching plan will change significantly. Yes there is plenty of worship available over the seven day week, but one Minister will only be able to get to all Sunday preaching places perhaps once every two months (Keeping in mind the Minister is also leading worships through the week).

So perhaps it's a particularly timely moment to think about how to make being Church less onerous for lay leaders, and at the same time, provide an opportunity to thrive. If we're open to talking about this, sometimes what looks like bad news can actually be transformational.

And its good to keep in mind that this Partnership is so well resourced financially, so there is plenty of resource for minor and major experiments. Across the Partnership there is about 10 million dollars of property – a wealth most community organisations and certainly rural congregations couldn't dream of.

So are there better and transformational ways that this huge resource could be more life-giving for congregations, and create a thriving future? If we are willing, the sky's the limit!

Its nine years now that I've had roles focusing on supporting congregations to vision and make the changes that create the opportunity to thrive. I've never seen a congregation take this step with willing hearts, and it not bear fruit. If it helps, I'm sure I, Annette and Meg would love the opportunity to come and spend time with your congregation as you consider these things.

What an inspirational place to be, with missional future conversations going on across it! May we have the courage and the imagination to keep responding to the call of Christ in this time.

REPORT FROM COCO

COCO met at Tylden on 4th June

Much time was spent on Planning issues arising out of the Retreat in February.

Discussion largely centred on Ministry support, in the interim, until Congregations are online. This could be some time off but progress is being made. A Minister can then lead Worship in a number of Congregations at the same time.

We now have 2 Congregations less, in the Partnership, but the Ministry Team has reduced from 3 to 1.5. It is hoped that we can continue with 1.5 next year with the .5 being ongoing.

Various suggestions were put forward to reduce the present heavy load on the Ministers, who also take Services during the week e.g., at nursing homes and mission work at the Hubs of Riddells Creek and Woodend

- .(a) try and provide administrative support for the Ministers such as triaging with various community groups, managing Synod and Presbytery communications, WWCC's, property forms etc.
- (b) not follow the Lectionary Readings so that a service could be repeated on different Sundays to another Congregation.

All of the above to be discussed at the Partnership Service at Woodend on 6th June at Woodend.

In the early 1990s, two 'youngish' Romsey couples began meeting weekly in each other's homes for meditation, in a practice aligned with the *World Community for Christian Meditation*. This quickly developed into a small group of long-term committed meditators, which has continued over thirty years to the present day, meeting for many years in the Catholic church and now in the Uniting Church Hall. One of the original members, Stephen Holgate, has been both Victoria and National Coordinator of the *WCCM Australia*. He explains, "the roots of the WCCM lie in the desert tradition of early Christianity dating back to the 4th century and beyond to scriptural times. Its recovery and promotion for the modern era was led particularly by John Main (1926-1982), an Irish Benedictine monk who, in 1975, started the first Christian Meditation Centre in London. This blossomed into the WCCM which now supports thousands of small groups throughout the world and in Australia."

The WCCM is an independent body and is not focused primarily on doctrine, but on teaching an ancient, simple, silent prayer practice aiming to bring the meditator into an interior harmony with the prayer of Jesus already present in the human 'heart'. A typical 45-minute weekly group meeting includes a short, recorded talk from the WCCM, a period of silent meditation, followed by a concluding prayer and perhaps some light conversation.
