A new church in Riddell for 2016

It has been 10 months since it was decided that the RCUC would go into temporary recess for 12 months. This followed a process where our numbers were declining steadily and our financial situation was also not good. Presbytery were not happy for us to take that final step and close permanently and we were keen to see what might come of the new Macedon Ranges Partnership before making a final decision.

Well that year has gone by in the blink of an eye and our partnership process has progressed in leaps and bounds and in the most positive direction that one could imagine. Wendy is now on board and is keen to be involved in whatever capacity she can.

Because of all these positive moves, I felt it most appropriate to call our congregation together again to discuss what they might like to do seeing that Christmas would soon be upon us, our 12 month semi-retirement was soon up and that our collective dreams for the partnership were rapidly starting to become reality. So a meeting was called for Sunday morning Nov 1st at 9:30am at our church.

After a little confusion regarding the meeting time so skilfully executed by myself, we all came together to discuss once again our future. It was also wonderful to have Wendy pop in before fulfilling her preaching duties at Mt Macedon to give her perspective on what could be options for us as we started to reconsider our future. It was most worthwhile to have her share these ideas directly, rather than coming from a third intermediary or at some later date. We were able to make an informed decision based on knowing the options we had before us, so thank you Wendy for sacrificing some sleep to come and

share your valuable thoughts.

So after considerable discussion, all of which was both positive and promising for the future, we decided that we would begin to meet again in 2016 as a congregation on a regular basis. It was also decided that this would mean that we would meet once a month during 2016, the dates to be decided and passed onto the partnership at a church council meeting to be held sometime before Christmas, where this decision to reopen our doors on a regular basis would also be ratified. The format and time of these meetings would be decided as the year marched on and those details disseminated to everyone via the PIP with plenty of warning. It was intended that we would use these opportunities to explore alternative ways and locations and formats of meeting together. It was in this area that Wendy was most helpful in showing us the many options that we could explore. So we embark upon our new journey in 2016 with both a little apprehension as to how it will all work out but also with excitement that we are all willing to explore the options to see where the Lord leads.

To add some impetus to our decision, our positive direction forward was enhanced by the completion of roof repairs to our church (see next page) and a complete interior repaint together with a request from CoCo that we proceed to renovate our back hall to be used as an office for the 3 ministers / a conference room / CoCo office in the southern end of the Ranges. This will also work with our intention to utilise the church building as a community meeting resource in conjunction with the local Neighbourhood House.

So we seek your support and prayers as we seek where the Lord leads and how he leads us into 2016.

Restoration & Community Garden

The restoration of our Welsh slate roof has now been completed, along with new spouting. Riddell has had its interior completely repainted. This turned into a major job as even the minute cracks, revealed deep depressions when the paint was stripped back. Anthony Trollope employed a deep wall specialist plasterer to fill all the faults before undercoating and top coating all walls.

The final result is stunning. Anthony's love of the church showed through in his meticulous work. He showed a particular interest in our stained glass window and while cleaning discovered the signature of the glass artist.

The artist was William Montgomery who had his business at 164 Flinders St, Melbourne. Trained in London and Germany, he arrived in Melbourne in 1887. He worked for both Catholic and Protestant congregations as well as private institutions. His work can be seen at Lowther Hall C.E.G.G.S. Essendon. Even though we do not have a date we know our stained glass window was constructed well after the building of the church. After the First World War, William focussed on commemorative pieces until his death in 1927. When researching, we discovered our stained glass window is one of the few round windows he carried out (and we think, by far the most beautiful).

Restoration work will be continuing......

The community garden has seen the end of the winter crop, with seedlings being added for summer. If you have a spare moment, feel welcome to plant seedlings in the spare beds, water or generally weed. The painters commented on the number of people that dropped in to look at the garden and therapeutically remove a few weeds for us.

From the 'Follow your box' facility we have learned that most of the boxes are on their way to Fiji. Eight of the 5-9 year old girls boxes are on their way to Thailand. There are only 2 of our boxes that have not yet been processed.

Asylum Seeker Network

Wendy Hebbard, from Gisborne UC, attended the Asylum Seeker Network meeting at Gladstone Park on Monday 16th November. She has provided a summary of the notes she took.

Speaker 1. Leonie Walker BapCare Sanctuary "House of Hope" project.

- Help for people looking for accommodation.
 No Government support.
- This project arose out of the Brunswick project. They liaise closely with Lentara. So far, 300 people have benefitted from this project. Mostly men.
- Residents pay a little money or none. Their

- support is 89% of Newstart.
- Rentals might be \$190 out of \$240 pension.
- Recently, the church purchased a former aged care facility nearby.
- Volunteers are needed eg; English language tutors. And employment opportunities.
- Material aid presents some difficulties.
 Transport and storage of goods is required.
 Does anyone know of a spare empty shed?
- From Woodend there have been some offers of weekend stays for refuges.
- Visits and home- sharing needs to be carefully thought out.

Speaker 2 John Uren from Ringwood North.

- The group's first attempt at using the church house for an Egyptian family did not work out.
- The greatest issue in the world----- There are 20,000,000 refugees increasing to around 60,000,000.
- Take a look at the Old Testament the Torah. The 'alien' is often mentioned in Deuteronomy. Caring for the 'alien' is a major agenda for the Church.
- People have a lot of suspicions about Asylum Seekers.
- When the Ringwood Church had Julian Burnside as a speaker, they expected 200 to turn up. Instead, there were over 400.
- Ideas having a Church garden vegetables go to Asylum Seekers.
- The whole issue has been politicised. We are looking at the dark side of the world.
- We should not patronise refugees but try to make our contacts "natural". Offer friendship.
- Keep writing to MP's and challenge government policy.
- There are 2,000 in detention centres. Peter Dutton is not very well-loved!
- Federal authorities are very insensitive to traumatised people.
- John gave some sad examples.

CoCo Report

This issue I would like to thank all the wonderful members in the Partnership who have helped me out this year. I would like to thank those who have helped with providing venues, set up and packed up venues, supplied morning teas, my fabulous scribe Sina who has made my job so much easier, Robert Renton for all his support during the year, my fellow members who have transported me to meetings, Jay for all the name tags and editing my Partnership in Print reports and especially my very supportive husband for all his help and understanding.

We have sent a request for continuation of Supply Ministry by Judy Rigby until 31st March to the Presbytery Pastoral Relations Committee. We have also sent a request for Jay Brooks' continuation to officiate at Eucharist within the Macedon Ranges Partnership.

We shall be undertaking a Safe Churches Training at 1:30pm on Saturday, 9th April at Riddells Creek Uniting Church following the April CoCo meeting. It is a requirement for all congregations to complete this training.

Rev Peter Cannon has accepted the call to Macedon Ranges Uniting Churches Partnership and will start on 1st February, with two weeks transition leave.

Paul Gilbertson gave the Treasurer's report. The Finance Meeting held on Wednesday 11th November decided to keep commitments for the Expenses and Stipend for 2016 the same as for 2015, unless unforeseen expenses should arise. Kyneton manse sewerage works have been completed. They are now waiting for final sign off by Coliban Water, probably after Christmas. A fence is to be erected before Christmas, which needs to be a paling fence due to heritage overlay. The manse will probably be for sale around March 2016.

Colin Chapman gave a report on progress with the new website. The hope of the committee is that the website will be in place within a short time.

Rev Deacon Wendy Elson provided an overview of the conversation program. The focus of the group will be on justice, transformation and inclusion. There is a hope that the group will enable issues of common concern within the wider community to be discussed and that connections will strengthen enabling shared faith opportunities to happen. Anyone can join the groups. We believe this idea will be good for the church to undertake deep listening to the greater community in which we live, enabling the congregations to understand more fully what the community we live in needs and how we can serve them better.

Planning for Rev Peter Cannon's Induction Service needs to be discussed with Presbytery. It is expected to take place about the middle of February 2016.

Discussion was held about the need for the Partnership to provide an office as a base for the Ministers. There is the possibility that this will be at Riddells Creek UC. Further discussion needed

A timetable of Christmas Services and Activities has been sent to all local monthly publications.

The Memorandum of Understanding states that open meetings will be held three times a year to give members of the congregations who wish to attend an opportunity for creative thinking, planning for the Partnership and its mission, celebrating new developments throughout the Partnership and to hear any concerns. It was great to see those Partnership members who joined us at Barfold and made contribution to the meeting.

Minister's Reports

Wendy Elson provided a detailed written report of her past month. Here is some of what she

wrote.

The last month has been a time of consolidating relationships and discerning the way forward. I have still done a little of treading water at times too as we await the future partnership ministers when we can be more specifically ministering in our designated roles.

During the last month I have been doing a lot of services. I have also tried to help groups working "outside the square" as we explore together different ways to be Church. We have continued to develop the idea of Church with the Woodend group. Riddell's Creek and I are in conversation around discerning how we can best reinvigorate the group there and be at mission together in that community.

I have met up with several other local ministers groups and participated with them in memorial services at several aged care facilities and also conducted a communion service at RM Begg.

I have been given some wonderful opportunities to share in the hospitality offered by various groups such as the Thistle Club's high tea and the talk given by D'Arcy and Janet at Gisborne UCAF.

I spent a great day at Lancefield with lan getting to know a few people around town and discerning how best to serve the folks there. I spent some time with Sam and Casey at Kyneton Caring Communities and have networked with a few other groups and churches about how we can best be in service together and where there may be opportunities we can develop.

We had a great community CFA service (well I enjoyed it!) at Metcalfe.

One particular blessing this month has been a connection with the Woodend Men's Shed. These guys willingly took an idea from a template for a 'holding cross' and have made me several of these lovely wooden crosses for use with the sick and elderly. (See 'Page 2' for a photo)

Another blessing has been the group looking at intentional transformational conversations. This has led to some really interesting conversations and opportunities.

I continue to see the Spirit of God at work as people are interrupted and surprised by new opportunities to dream. People are looking for opportunities to work together and are listening together to see where we might be able to move forward into shared ministry opportunities.

I also attended my Valedictory service from Pilgrim Theological College recently. The work for my degree is now complete. Yay!!!

Thank you to you all for the hospitality, the love and the support you are offering me and for your willingness to be available to God and the church in so many ways.

Judy Rigby has been busy undertaking Pastoral Care visits in conjunction with Wendy. She has also led services in Kyneton and the Northern Churches during the last month. Over the next month Judy shall be leading services within other congregations of the Partnership including Tylden, Mount Macedon, Lancefield/Romsey and Gisborne.

Partnership News

Northern – The Northern Churches are going well. The Country Fire Authority Blessing of the Fire Trucks was well attended by members of the community. Everyone had an enjoyable day. The community events are well supported. There is an increase in optimism and positive attitude, which has brought an increase in numbers at church.

<u>Kyneton</u> – We also have seen an increase in positive attitude towards the church. It seems to be a happier place and we have a notable increase in numbers attending services. There has been a noted inclusion of the Northern Congregations in the Partnership, which was a concern of ours when the Macedon Ranges partner-

ship was first formed.

Tylden – Thanks to Rev. Dr. D'Arcy Wood for all his services to our congregation over the last 12 months. This has enabled us to have Holy Communion on a regular basis. We have been asked to assist the local Fire Brigade cater for a funeral and are also catering for the Tylden Primary School Year 6 graduation. We are going along well.

<u>Woodend</u> – We are still having challenges with our building. We are now joining together on a regular basis in the Woodend manse to worship, which is helping to keep us together.

<u>Lancefield</u> – David Noble, one of our Congregation and CoCo representatives and his family are moving back to Melbourne. We shall be sorry to see them go as they have given a lot of support to us during the time they have been in Lancefield.

We have increasing numbers at church with more children also attending. The impact of fires created a level of shock in the town. We opened the church for private prayer on Wednesday and Thursday following the fires.

Romsey – We are also sorry to lose David Noble who is in the worship team and a great support.

We are in the planning phase of the 'Follow the Star' event and are looking forward to the walk through the town which will be led by Mary & Joseph and a donkey. We ask you to come and enjoy the nights dressed as a character from those times. See advertising opposite. At least one night we will be accompanied by the Kyneton Municipal Band.

This year we managed to donate 120 Operation Christmas child shoeboxes. We had spent all year collecting and then a day together packing. We were also surprised and delighted by a donation of \$1,100 from a local transport company 'Just in Time Transport' to help cover the freight cost.

Mount Macedon -The Thistle Club had a de-Partnership in Print December 2015 / January 2016 lightful afternoon, where we enjoyed a high tea at our 'Spring Afternoon Tea'. The speaker of the day was Sam from Kyneton Care and Community, who spoke about their work through the Food Bank and Counselling Services. We had the pleasure of company from members of other churches within the partnership as well as neighbouring congregations. We are about to begin a series of Advent Bible Studies, starting on Thursday 26th November 2015, between 10:30am and 12noon. We are using the 'Emmanuel, God is with us' study book. These bible studies go for four weeks.

<u>Gisborne</u> – Is currently holding Advent bible studies, because we decided to begin early, having started on Friday 6th November. Our prayer group meets twice a week on Tuesday at 2pm and Friday at 10am. Anyone who is in the area at these times is most welcome to join us. We have a trolley in the supermarket where food can be left for Lentara.

Renovations update, the front is almost complete, the parking area will be concreted next week. Lighting is being erected around the signs which will show these up nicely at night. The back has been finished as a usable space, where barbeques can be held or small meetings conducted.

Other News

Mark Dunn, one of the Presbytery reps on CoCo, also endorsed giving to the Christmas Bowl appeal after a trip to India this year where he saw some of the projects supported by Christmas Bowl.

Gisborne Chaplaincy informed us that money has been reduced from school funding. The support group need to find \$5,000 more next year to help fund the chaplain. They have lost \$20,000 of Federal funding. Thank you to the local churches for their continued support of the chaplains.





Timmy nonchalantly replied, 'Yeah, I know who she is.'


The little girl said, 'Well, who is she?'

What is the Christmas Bowl? The Christmas appeal of Act for Peace

Today, 2,000 churches from 19 denominations come together every year to share this special tradition and help the world's most vulnerable. This invitation to Australian Christians to stand by men, women and children living through conflict and displacement is, sadly, more important


