Hope Faith Love

Recent protests by teenage school students against the failure of governments to increase their actions addressing climate change have continued around the world. Such protests are becoming a regular feature in our major cities. There is a real fear among our young that they are going to have to deal with significant increases in global temperatures, higher sea levels and more extreme weather events than any generation before them.

There is concern the change will result in the extinction of whole species and damage to much of the natural world, to say nothing of the difficulties they will face to even survive.

Scientific reports do nothing to ease their fears but instead reinforce them.

Into this add the ongoing tensions between the US, North Korea, Russia and China, the instability of the Middle East and constant uncertainties of Brexit and other nationalistic movements. The movement of refugees around the world has hit an all-time high with 30,000 people becoming refugees every day and with a total of around 70 million refugees in the world. Extremist

ideologies are feeding terrorist events. International conflicts are simmering just below the surface. State sponsored data wars (hacking, fake news and spying) are reported in our newspapers regularly. The Doomsday Clock has recently been moved to 2 minutes to midnight. And global media brings the impact of all these things into our lounge rooms 24/7.

Is it any wonder then that there is a plethora of dystopian “post-apocalyptic” movies, tv shows, computer games and books all focusing on what the world will be like some time in the near future

following some catastrophic event? Some speculate about a disease devastating the population, others following some nuclear conflagration and others dealing with the consequences of climate change. Most are pessimistic. Even in Western conservative Christian circles there is extensive literature anticipating a period of tribulation in the near future leading to the return of Christ.

So where are we in all this? On Radio National, I heard an interview with James Ricketson, movie maker recently incarcerated in a Cambodian prison on spying charges. He was asked what kept up his hope in the midst of the struggle of his confinement? He answered, “without hope, what is there?”

Looking around our Partnership this week I had a paradoxical insight. I was hearing of many from around our Partnership who are struggling with ill health and loss of well-being. Others were coping with grief and loss. Life is not easy for many of us.

Listening again, I noticed something significant. I heard of people stepping in to offer care, of others praying, others doing something practical and in all, sharing love and compassion. The community and care permeated the interactions. Hope was alive.

In the pain of our communities, I saw the fear of the world challenged. Fear builds walls between people. People withdraw into self-interest and despair. In our struggles, loving compassionate support was evident. Walls were broken down as people sat together and worked side by side. Soft edges between people allowing gentleness and God’s love to shine through. Hope, faith and love...

During a recent grief experience, I noticed how easy it is to withdraw. Isolation and pain can overwhelm us. I also noticed that when the pain is shared, bonds are strengthened and the road becomes just a little easier.

It is strange but when we soften the edges between us, are gentle with each other (even gracious) and offer positive care we all grow. When we allow fear to dictate, build walls and allow suspicion to ferment, community dies. Strength does not guarantee survival. Sacrifice and vulnerability open us to life. If there is one thing the cross of Jesus continues to remind us of, it is when we let go, the Spirit of God is able to bring new life.

On 2nd May a gathering at the “Three Little Pigs” in Gisborne listened to presentations on the **Voluntary Assisted Dying** legislation which has now come into operation in Victoria. Different points of view were expressed and all were heard respectfully.

The UC Synod of Victoria and Tasmania, meeting in July, has also heard different points of view. In the detailed resolutions which were eventually passed, those “for” and “against” the legislation are both acknowledged as having good reasons for their viewpoint - flowing from their Christian convictions.

The Synod decided that the Epworth Network (affiliated with the UCA) and aged care establishments be allowed to follow the provisions of the new legislation. There are several provisos:

- (i) that the UC continues to make palliative care available in its institutions;
- (ii) that UC institutions follow the government legislation strictly;
- (iii) that doctors and staff who do not agree with the legislation will not be pressured to participate in Voluntary Assisted Dying.

REPORT OF COCO MEETING HELD ON SATURDAY 6TH JULY AT LANCEFIELD

Rita Vandervalk presented a reflection on the upcoming NAIDOC week.

The minutes of the Coco Meeting held in June were confirmed.

Further renovations on the Riddells Creek site have been put on hold until an OH&S inspection is performed on the work already completed.

Kyneton UC representatives are planning an information session to be arranged for the Spring. Representatives from Synod, Uniting Housing and the Shire Council will attend and the session will cover ways that Church owned property can be utilised.

The questions for the upcoming survey are still in progress. It is proposed that the survey will be in two parts: questions for church councils to answer and questions for individual members of the congregation to answer.

Interviews for the supply minister position will be taking place shortly.

The property for Mission handbook for the Woodend Missional Centre has been completed and the final draft submitted to Synod.

Mention and thanks was made to Robyn Zumstein who has taken on the role of PIP editor.

Deidre Palmer – President of the UCA will be visiting the Macedon Ranges Partnership on the weekend of the 19/20 October. A Partnership service will be held on the 20th.

The Ministry Team Report was written by Peter Cannon. The report was titled “a sketch of the work of a minister” and gave a synopsis of the day to day events in a minister’s life.

There was a short discussion on what the long-term plan for the Woodend Manse is seeing it is currently vacant. No decision to be made until after the supply minister is appointed in case they require a residence.

The congregations all gave a brief account of events since the previous Coco meeting and any upcoming events.

There are plans for a Church Camp at DOXA for 2020. Late March was the most supported time of the year so Peter Cannon will contact DOXA to book in a weekend.

George Roberts has resigned from Coco.

Op Shop – are trialing volunteers through Matchworx; work for the dole program.

The next meeting will be at Gisborne on 3rd August.

Hence his emphasis on contemplation, "being in the presence of and being present to all of life." A form of knowing that leads beyond reason, rationalism and information to wisdom, perception and experience.

THE PROGRAM

"Enchantment. Disenchantment. Re-enchantment. In recent years Progressive Christianity has drifted toward rationalism and atheism. While these are worthwhile intellectual and philosophical pursuits, they will not sustain the heart of faith and new adventures in religion or spirituality. Neither will a solely biblical approach to faith provide us with the emerging knowledge we need. Biblical knowledge must be supplemented with the wisdom of the earth and universe to give us the ultimate meanings that lead to a re-enchantment of full life we desire.

"For this we need, poetry, narrative, ancient wisdom from various traditions, landscape and inner commitment. This is best provided by the process of contemplation. In our time together we will consider a few contemporary contemplatives and consider the richness of the wholistic life. A short video of the Irish poet and philosopher John O'Donohue will be shown as well as some input from Christopher Page and table discussion."
