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# **Towards Lent**

Several members of the Partnership attended the Gisborne Chaplaincy fundraiser recently, where we saw the movie Hidden Figures. It tells the story of the African-American women, focussing on three in particular, who played a significant role in the mathematical and engineering departments of NASA in the early days of space exploration. After the movie, which was

an inspiring story of hope, resilience and achievement, I couldn't help but feel sad. Perhaps it was the notion that so many other people like these women might live richer and more fulfilling lives, and might contribute enormously to society, but are denied the opportunity to do so because of the circumstances into which they are born. Or perhaps it was the casual racism, the way a room full of professional white men fell silent when a black woman walked in to claim her place. The way one of the characters was denied the promotion and pay she deserved for the job she was doing. The silent introduction of the coffee pot for 'coloreds', not filled as the other was, into the workroom newly blessed by the presence of the brilliant African-American mathematician. Looking back from 2017 it seems almost unbelievable that Katherine Johnson and her colleagues were treated that way. Surely we live in more enlightened times?

The Presbytery has recently undergone a 'cultural audit'; a process of having someone from outside critique the way the Presbytery operates. It can be very helpful, occasionally, to stop and take stock and to have an outsider's view of how a group is operating. We are all blind to the cultural influences on our lives, except, perhaps, those who have travelled widely or lived for extended periods of times in a different culture. The influence of our culture can blind us to what is obvious to outsiders, can make us feel comfortable with the way things are. It's especially dangerous when churches and Christians are not able to fully live out the values of the kingdom of God because they begin to equate the values of their own culture with those of the Church. I'm sure the people who treated Katherine Johnson and her colleagues with such disdain were good, church-going people, but that was just how things were in the 60s in the US. People didn't usually act with what they would have recognise as hatred, it was quite reasonable within their culture to treat others that way. There were few white Christians who were able to step outside their inherited beliefs to question the status quo of their community.

If we were to ask someone to do a cultural audit of our congregations, I wonder what we'd find. There would be much to be commended: faithful people generously, courageously, humbly, resolutely living out their faith in changing and sometimes difficult times and circumstances. But I wonder what the 'areas for improvement' that an outsider would identify, to which we are blind, might be. Those of us who are part of the church as it is, even though we might be critical sometimes, are generally well catered for by the current status quo. Lent approaches, and we are invited once more by the rhythms of the Church year to pare back, to focus on what is important in our lives and what is superfluous. During this Lent, I wonder if we can try to see ourselves as an outsider might see us. We spoke at the Partnership service in January about hearing the gospel from 'underneath'. Are there ways in which we unwittingly close the door to others who might not quite fit in with the church culture in which we are comfortable? Just how much are we prepared to move to encourage others to take their seat at the table? During Lent, perhaps we can prayerfully ask God to show us what is vital to our life as congregations, and what we can let go of in order to prepare ourselves for the new life that the Spirit is already stirring in our midst.

We both managed to get home by May 2016 but Sandra needed to go back to hospital in July to get a new hip. David was very close to death when he had his stroke and Sandra died twice over the 18 months, but I think that God still has things for us to do. We would not be where we are today without the constant prayer support that has carried us through. Thank you from the bottom of our hearts. You have all been a comfort when needed, a shoulder to cry on and hand to hold when feeling alone .

David and I have had what seems to have been a bad time, but it has been a time of love, support and a realization of how blessed we are. Each and every one of you have blessed us and we THANK YOU.

# **Coco Report**

# for Meeting held Saturday 4th February 2017 at Woodend UC

<u>Welcome</u>: Chairperson Colin welcomed us for our first Coco Meeting of the year. Also a big welcome and thank you to Fiona Armour from Mt.Macedon UC who has agreed to provide secretarial support to CoCo.

**Devotions:** Alison Killoh from the Woodend congregation welcomed us to the Woodend property. The Woodend Hall is used to store and distribute Op Shop items and Alison used this to focus on these donated items, their backgrounds and the people who have owned them. Then their reuse when they go to new owners. The reading for tomorrow is about salt and how that is used to lift and flavour our food – we can do the same for our lives and the lives of others.

Minutes of Previous Meeting: were accepted.

**Ministry Team:** Discussion about what worked or not over the January services. Many positives and some negatives. Some not happy to travel etc. All present felt we needed to have a discussion with our Congregations to get feedback rather then what we personally felt.

Wendy expressed her passion for different ways to conduct worship. We need, as a Partnership, to embrace all age worship and to step outside our comfort zone. She also needs our support at Community events eg. Community Christmas Carols, Blue Christmas services etc. We need to re-commit to the Partnership ideals.

A lot of discussion resulting from this. Including suggestions of more publicity for community events and if this happens the congregations need to support the events and interact with the community – acting out our vision of touching the lives of more people.

Colin summed up – where to from here? We moved on to Strategic Planning to try to address these concerns.

<u>Strategic Planning:</u> A sheet was distributed encapsulating the Partnership components –

Ministry, Op Shop, Finance, Connection, Property, Executive and Goals and Objectives. Lots of thoughts discussed re utilising peoples expertise in different areas eg. Events Planning, Property Management, Finance, Connections with community groups etc.

The Ministry Team asked if there are people interested in joining a team. Eventually it was decided that Wendy lead a <u>Community Engagement Team</u> – Meg Evans and Paul Gilbertson volunteered for this.

Annette will lead a <u>Pastoral Care Team</u> – Bev. Gilbertson and Anne Fyfield will be on this team.

Administration of Property and Finance Team – Will consist of Ian Kennedy, Noel Shaw, Paul Gilbertson.

Peter will lead an <u>Education Resources Team</u> – Jay Brooks and Pip Elston will be on board with this.

Anyone interested in joining these teams is most welcome.

**Financial Report:** Paul submitted his report. Budget for 2017 still to be done. Paul concerned re shortfall by 2020. How will this be addressed – fund raising, Presbytery to contribute more?? Query re buying a house in Kyneton with Kyneton Manse money to keep pace with inflation. Rent from this would assist financial position.

<u>**Property Committee:**</u> Haven't met for this year, will report when this has happened.

**Labyrinth:** See plan published in February Partnership In Print. This is moving ahead and a date for a Working Bee will be publicised.

High Risk Fire Days: Strategy worked out and can be viewed on Website.

<u>Website:</u> Keep checking this – more info becoming available all the time.

**Signage:** A sketch to be distributed for approval for signage on Notice Boards. Also a banner to be used at Community Events.

<u>Neighbour Day:</u> Possibly a picnic in a local park for each Congregation – each Congregation to discuss this. 19th March suggested date for this.

**<u>Baptism Supplies:</u>** These have been purchased and are held at the Church Office.

#### **Consensus Model**

We handed over to D'Arcy who explained to us the beginnings of the "Consensus Model" of running Church meetings. Originally designed to encourage young people to participate on Church Councils. A change from the adversarial system which could be manipulated. In 1994 a Manual For Meetings was adopted – some revisions have been made since then. The aim is to try and work together on an issue and discern God's Will in our discussions. The Chairperson needs to be sensitive to the participants feelings on issues. It is used widely in the Uniting Church  not always successfully. The card system is only part of the process. Annette will elaborate on this at the next Coco Meeting in March.

**Culture Of Safety Project:** Colin will send Safe Church/Safe Child info to each Congregation to see if we comply. This needs to be sorted out. D'arcy has established that not all on Church Council need Working With Children Certification. Annette will see if more Training Days will be held.

<u>Other Business:</u> Peter promoted Education For Ministry Program run by Father Greg Davies.

**Congregation Reports:** Most Congregations have their usual Groups operating again for the year. Woodend still have problems with the building works. Gisborne promoted Peter Barcham Lecture and Hymn Workshop for Lent and Easter.

Annette told us that Jay Brooks had been given permission to give Communion. CoCo need to apply for an extension of this.

The next Meeting of CoCo is on Saturday 4th March at Mt Macedon UC at 9:30 am. This is an Open Meeting. All welcome.

#### Dignity For Girls – International

For girls growing up in developing countries, lack of sanitary supplies is a major issue. Many

are forced to miss large chunks of school each year and face days of isolation every month. Days for Girls is an international



NGO made up of volunteers from all over the world who sew reusable and safe sanitary supplies for use in developing countries.

While distributing these hand-made supplies in the recipient country, Days for Girls also deliver hygiene and reproductive health information and, where possible, teaches local women to sew their own kits for future use. In East Gippsland, Victoria, an existing Days for Girls chapter is looking to expand and recruit more people to sew hygiene kits; with a specific focus on sending a large supply to girls in the Pacific Islands during 2017.

Your Lenten Offering will provide sewing machines and over lockers, fabric and other materials needed to produce the kits.

#### Ministry Training – National

Preparing to become a Minister of the Word or Deacon in the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress (UAICC) involves training and study. After all, ministry is more than just

a profession; it's a calling.

Currently that training takes place at Nungalinya College in Darwin (or at UCA Theological Colleges in other states) and pro-



vides ministry candidates with a foundation in biblical studies, church history and theology.

Congress has identified a need to provide additional training about the formation of the UAICC and to address recent developments in biblical and theological studies. Congress also sees value in providing opportunities for ministry candidates throughout Australia to meet.

Your Lenten Offering will help cover the costs of bringing together trainee ministers twice a year for a residential program designed to meet these additional training and social needs.

# Sharing Worship and Faith – Victoria

Weekly church services are an important part



of Christian life – a chance to receive vital teaching and spend time in the presence of God. But for many people living in the Henty region of Victoria, age – as well as the distance to local services – prevents them from getting to church. Many Uniting Church congregations in this area also struggle to keep leaders, as they move on or retire.

To help address this problem, the local Hamilton Uniting Church plans to live stream their services to local hospitals, aged care facilities and homes. Not only will this bring services directly to ageing congregation members, and provide a viable alternative for struggling congregations, it will also enable the message of Jesus to be shared more widely – perhaps even to people who have never stepped foot in a church before.

Your Lenten Offering will help the church purchase the necessary equipment for live streaming, including three digital cameras, a digital recording device, high capacity modem and associated cables and switches.

#### **Growing Together – Tasmania** At the heart of one of Tasmania's most dis-

advantaged areas lies a community garden.



More than just a place to grow fruit and vegetables for people in the community, the garden is also a place where people grow friendships.

The garden helps foster community connection, while also teaching people beneficial skills in horticulture and planting.

Fruits and vegetables grown in the garden improve the nutrition of families doing it tough, who might otherwise go without, as well as local school children.

Your Lenten Offering will help cover the costs of employing a part-time gardener to manage this garden (as well as oversee a second smaller garden used by local UnitingCare family services participants).

# **Bible Society - 200 not out**

Australia's longest living organisation may not be who you think it is.

It's not Houghton Wines or Westpac or the Australian Agricultural Company and it's certainly not McDonalds.

There wasn't a Big Mac in sight when community leaders Governor and Lady Macquarie cre-

ated Bible Society in 1817.

Ahead of its Bicentenary on 7th March 2017, Bible Society remains the oldest continually operating organisation in our nation's history.

The only change is the name. In 2010, the Bible Societies in each state merged into a single organisation, Bible Society Australia.

It's still involved in the translation, publishing, and distribution of the Bible. BSA also aims to engage people with what it calls the Good Book, using both traditional and the latest media.

Bible Society Australia CEO

Greg Clarke says "we're not content simply to hand our Bibles. We want to help people engage with the Bible and answer their questions about it".

"We're celebrating our 200 years of sharing the Bible by doing more of what supporters want us to do – championing the Bible worldwide, from prisons in Australia to churches in China".

In our increasingly secular society, the Bible remains the world's best-selling book with more than five billion copies printed.

But is it still relevant to Australians?

Bible Society claims the good book is foundational to our human rights and legal system. Page 16 According to Human Rights barrister Geoffrey Robertson QC, the philosophic basis of the right to human dignity is the parable of the good Samaritan.

Our charities also reflect the well-known parable. Of the 30 largest charities in Australia, 26 are faith-based. They argue that Bible readers

are more likely to volunteer to help others.

The values that Australians cherish also stem from the Bible.

A common ANZAC statement is from John 15:13: "Greater love has no one than this – to lay down one's life for one's friends".

Bible Society claims it's a verse that captures our national vision for humility, sacrifice and friendship between equals.

Following Arthur Stace's one word campaign "eternity" is a Bible word most Australians would recognise. Christians

believe it's the message of God's love for us in Jesus Christ and a love that will last forever.

Eternity is also the title of Bible Society's news service which reaches hundreds of thousands of people via newspaper and digitally.

To mark its 200th birthday, Bible Society Australia is staging a national celebration service on Sunday 5th March, 2017. Bible Society Australia wants this celebration to be more about elevating the place of the Bible rather than about Bible Society itself.

The event will be held at the Hillsong Main Auditorium in Sydney. Church groups of every de-



nomination are encouraged to stream the event as a lighthouse church. Details at www.bible.org.au.

Dr Clarke says "Over the past 200 years, the Bible has done Australia a lot of good".

He says the work will continue both here and throughout the world, adding "the Good Book really is here for good".


